Introduction

The Entry Certificate in Business Analysis (ECBA) exam has evolved to serve the IIBA global community's vision for a foundational exam in business analysis. This vision is centred on the practical application of business analysis, equipping certificate holders with job-ready competencies to contribute effectively and produce actionable outcomes.

These updates mark a major step forward in preparing business analysis professionals to be able to contribute effectively to make an impact within organizations.

Why do these changes matter? The revised ECBA focuses more on practical application, situation-based learning, and essential business analysis concepts. It reflects the fundamentals of what hiring managers expect and ensures training programs provide real value to learners.

For training partners, this means an opportunity to refresh course materials, align with updated learning outcomes, and ensure students are job-ready from day one.

This document will guide you through everything you need to know to align your courses with the new ECBA exam.

Development Process

The Certificate

The ECBA is a globally recognized certification designed to equip aspiring business analysis professionals with foundational skills and knowledge. In updating the exam, our development process was guided by a commitment to rigour, relevance, and alignment with the real-world needs of organizations. This process involved several key phases:

- Comprehensive research: Leveraging insights from existing frameworks, professional input, and industry trends
- Community engagement: Actively involving practitioners worldwide to shape the exam content
- Expert validation: Ensuring content quality and accuracy through rigorous review by subject matter experts (SMEs)



Global Practice Analysis

We conducted a practice analysis across our global community of business analysis professionals. This process captured diverse perspectives on the tasks, responsibilities, and skills required in the field. The practice analysis informed the identification of domains, activity statements, and outcomes ensuring the exam reflects current and emerging trends in business analysis.

Aligning With Real-World Work

The ECBA exam is designed to align closely with the responsibilities business analysis professionals perform in their daily work. By analyzing feedback from practitioners and stakeholders, we focused on creating an exam that emphasizes practical applications over purely theoretical knowledge, equipping candidates with skills they can immediately apply in the workplace.

SME Panel Reviews

To validate the exam's alignment with industry expectations, multiple panels of SMEs were convened. These panels reviewed exam questions and the overarching structure to ensure they accurately reflect the competencies required for a foundational exam in business analysis. The SMEs' expertise was instrumental in creating an exam that is both challenging and fair.

A Data-Focused Approach

IIBA partnered with Kryterion, a leader in psychometric services, to develop an exam blueprint that forms the basis of a valid and reliable exam and meets the highest standards of assessment. As a SOC II-certified organization, Kryterion brought robust methodologies to the practice analysis survey development, administration, analysis, and the resulting exam blueprint.

A Practical and Situation-Focused Exam

The ECBA exam content draws from *The Business Analysis Standard*, *A Guide to the Business Analysis Body of Knowledge (BABOK Guide)*, and practical, contextual situations regularly encountered by business analysis professionals. This approach to content development helps ensure that the exam reflects real-world business analysis tasks, critical activities, outcomes, and challenges, and that it remains both relevant and adaptable to the evolving demands of the profession.



Key Changes in the ECBA Exam

The enhanced ECBA introduces key changes that impact how training partners should structure their course materials. To ensure alignment, here's what you need to know:

Greater Emphasis on Application Over Memorization

- The exam has shifted from knowledge recall to application-based questions
- Training should focus on practical situations where candidates must apply concepts, not just define them
- Examples:
 - Instead of asking "What is a stakeholder?," a question may now ask candidates to identify the most relevant stakeholder for a given situation
 - o Rather than defining elicitation techniques, candidates must determine the best elicitation method for a specific challenge within an initiative

Expanded Role of the Business Analysis Core Concept Model (BACCM)

- The BACCM is now central to the ECBA, guiding how concepts are taught and tested
- Course materials should introduce the BACCM early and reinforce how its six core concepts interact in real-world business analysis
- Expect exam questions requiring candidates to apply the BACCM to different contexts

Revised Exam Structure and Format

- The exam structure has transitioned from five knowledge areas to nine domains. The nine domains include the six components of the BACCM and three foundational domains: Understanding Business Analysis, Mindset for Effective Business Analysis, and Implementing Business Analysis
- The number of questions remains 50, but the question format includes both situation-based and standard multiple-choice questions
- The exam length is now 75 minutes to allow for deeper engagement with situation-based questions



Alignment With Industry Expectations

- The new ECBA exam was built using validated industry data and feedback from experienced professionals with a focus on fundamental business analysis skills and knowledge
- Employers expect ECBA holders to demonstrate job readiness, so training should include real-world application of business analysis tasks
- In addition to the *what* and *why* of business analysis techniques, the new exam encourages learners to think critically about *how* business analysis techniques address challenges and solve business problems

Key Takeaways for Training Partners

- Update course materials to prioritize practical application, the performance of the 30 business analysis tasks, and real-world business challenges
- Incorporate situation-based learning to align with the exam's new question format
- Emphasize BACCM integration throughout training, along with understanding and implementing foundational business analysis principles and mindset
- Ensure training reflects industry expectations, focusing on competencies over definitions
- Use contextual examples and situational practice exercises to help learners develop applied knowledge
